Where to Begin?













Family Advocates have a highly demanding role to play. There is not any simple way of describing what all a Family Advocate does. In order to be a Family Advocate you MUST have a caring heart for families and children.

At times a Family Advocate feels as they are the nurturer, secretary, mechanic, bus driver, nurse, physician, referee, and much more!



Let's take a look some of those responsibilities!

- #1 responsibility building trusting relationships with the families.
- Recognize and identify each family's needs.
- Encourage families to be an advocate for their child(ren).
- Making contacts with resources to help families.
- Finding resources.
- Helping families to make appointments.

What else does a Family Advocate do?

- Help in the recruitment process.
- Submit required reports to Managers.
- Being familiar with policies and procedures.
- Maintain documentation on families and children.
- Completing of PFCE Family Needs/Goals Assessment.
- Developing of Family Partnerships Agreements with families.
- Setting up Parent Meetings.
- Insure all children have a valid immunization.
- And much more......

Some things that other programs have Family Advocates to do.....

- Keep in mind these are things we can do also.
- 2 3 required home visits a year.
- Monthly phone contacts with families.
- All Family Assessments are done in the home.
- Family in need are seen more frequently....meaning more than 2 home visits.
- Every 5 weeks a home visit is done with everyone on the caseload.
- PFCE Framwork done 3 times a year.

More things from other programs.....

- PFCE Framework and Family Assessment are completed separately.
- Monthly meetings with Family Services Manager.
- Schedules of whereabouts submitted to Family Services Manager.
